Anne Golden received her BA in history from University College, University of Toronto, in 1962. She then went on to do her MA at Columbia University and her Ph. D in American history at the University of Toronto.

She has been recognized for her dedication and role in the public-policy area. In 1996, she chaired a task force for the Ontario government on the future of the Toronto area and, in 1998, was appointed chair of the Toronto Homelessness Action Task Force. Anne Golden is the author of a number of publications on public-policy issues.

In 1982, she joined the United Way of Greater Toronto and rose to the position of president in 1987, continuing in that role through 2001. Later that year, she became the president and CEO of the Conference Board of Canada. In June 2012, she stepped down from that position and began a new role as distinguished visiting scholar and special advisor at Ryerson University.

Anne Golden has received honorary doctorates and diplomas from numerous universities and colleges. In addition, she has garnered numerous awards for her dedication to public policy and, in 2003, she was made a Member of the Order of Canada in recognition of her commitment to social justice.
